

**FORUM:** United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization

**QUESTION OF:** Considering sport participation of transgender people in their respective categories, ensuring equality at the Olympics

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization,

*Recalling* the International Olympic Committee's new framework for transgender and intersex athletes announced on November 17th 2021,

*Acknowledging* the struggles faced by victims of human rights violations based on gender identity as per resolution A/HRC/17/L.9/Rev. 1,

*Recognising* the important role the international community plays in helping these people be a part of the sporting world and ensuring they receive fair treatment,

1. Urges for all Member States to ensure equity in competitions by:
  - a. Ensuring that that their transgender athletes meet the following requirements before being allowed to take part in any professional sporting competitions:
    - i. Having their legal gender changed,
    - ii. Having a gender authentication from a domestic hospital,
    - iii. Taking a test showing a testosterone level of less than 10 nanomoles per liter for at least one month prior to competition for male to female trans athletes,
  - b. Penalizing athletes discovered to be fabricating these documents by banning them from participating in future competitions on an international level for an 8 year period;
2. Encourages all Member States to rely on the Olympic Committee and each individual sporting event's coordinators to ensure fair competition for all so that:
  - a. Each sport committee will determine the eligibility criteria and said criteria will apply to both cisgender and transgender participants,
  - b. Each sport committee will therefore be allowed to deny the access to the competition in one category if a person does not fit the eligibility criterias;
3. Invites fellow Member States to collaborate on solutions that would help the cause by, but not limited to reaffirming laws regarding the participation of transgender people already in place,

4. Calls upon the United Nations to further implement anti-discriminatory laws on an international level in several ways such as but not limited to:
  - a. Bringing awareness through educational programs,
  - b. Promoting anti-violence laws and sentiments which would denounce hate speech and acts of violence against LGBT+ minorities;
5. Remains seized on the matter.
